GOSPORT & SOUTHAMPTON	l Jun		Loading begins for Exercise "Overlord". All first tide guns and vehs loaded at GOSPORT and SOUTHAMPTON efficiently, quickly and without accident or breakdown. Maj Stronach, Unit Deployment Officer, and his party embarked. L.C.T. personnel also embarked today. By this time the equipment of the Regiment has reached a peak that can only be surpassed as advancing time brings further inventions. Each S.P. is not only a mobile fort, but also a mobile arsenal carrying a double quota of 105 ammunition and also small arms ammunition, reserves and mines for use of the Infantry. The rear platforms of the S.P's. are piled high and in addition a "porpose" is towed behind. 	5 Jun	. (Con	t'd.) Letters from General Eisenhower and General Montgomery are distributed to all personnel. Practically all personnel take advantage of the permission that is granted to notify friends that they are going into action - letters will be mailed by Navy after the ships return. The L.C.T's and smaller craft push out into the Channel in the afternoon with the larger ships moving off to timings based on their roles and speeds. The Channel is by far the roughest that we have ever encountered on an exercise and unfortunately there is considerable seasickness.	ATK
ST AUBINS- SUR-MER	6 Jun		"D" DAY. Considerable improvement in the weather and despite seasickness the morale of all personnel is high as we prepare for the operation towards which we have been building up for so long. In general it seems no different from previous exercises and certainly there is nothing strange or disconcerting in the preparations that have to be made. Some are as little more serious than normally; some a little gayer, but all radiate a spirit of readiness and confidence. The rough crossing plays havoe with the orderliness of the L.C.T. flotillas and the M.L. with Maj Peene aboard only gets them collected and into formation after much trouble. "H" hour is first set for 0740 and the L.C.A's are lowered from the mother ships well out in the Channel approximately two hours before this. They form up and head for the French Coast and go past the L.C.T's looking like schools of water bugs. The Regiment has elements scattered throughout these little craft. The Regiment opens fire on the order of Maj Peene at approximately 0730 hrs, when 9000 yards from the beach. For 30 minutes the S.P's put down a very effective concentration on the enemy positionate, which helps the first waves to get across the sand strip. Our F.O.O. and Recce parties get in with the loss of one officer, Lt. Malcolm, wounded and one O.R., Chr McHughen, killed. On completion of the firing our L.C.T's turn and go out to prepare for beaching and landing. The first L.C.T. (D Tp) beaches at approximately 0910 hrs and though heavily mortared get off the beach and have their first S.P. in action in the prepared position at 0920 hrs, at which time "Q" Bty reported ready. "C" Tp got through about 5 minutes later, closely followed by "E" and "F" Tps. One of "E" Tp S.P's struck a mine and lost a track, but the crew stayed and repaired it and came along about two hrs later. "A" Tp unfortunately had two vehs, one S.P. and one half-track, receive direct hits, setting the S.P. on fire. The fire spread to two more S.P's and a carrier, but the remainder of the vehs got aw
