At approximately 1600 hrs the RAF shot down one "buzz bomb" over the cam which fell quite close to the GGFG's lines, damaging a few trucks and injuring one man. It was noted that more induries occurred by men diving under their tanks, bumping their heads, than by the blast from the bomb. Evidently a drill is required. The officers' softball team played a challenged game with the officers of 5 A/Tk Regt. The officers were quite outclassed lysing by a score of 14 - 2. The two teams were on the best of terms until one of our officers, at the end of the game, asked for three cheers for the AAs.	ALC.

The Div Adv Party Gp consisted of vehs of all shapes and sizes ranging from overladen jeeps to caravans. At 1205 hrs the Gp moved on Route laid down by 10 CIB Notes on Move. Coln moved very slowly, delayed by waterproofed caravans overheatland an amn truck at head of coln catching fire. Arrived at Camps 16 and 17 at 2200 hrs. At 2230 hrs we ate and received warning order to be ready to move at 0045 hrs.	SHIL

Summary of Events and Information Dane Hause Fair and warm. Orders to move have been received. The Regiment is busy making final MARRSFIELD 17 Jul 44 preparations for the move tonight at 0001 hrs. All track vehicles leave at this time CAMP. followed by all 'B' Vehicles at 0630 hrs tomorrow. At 2230 hrs the roar of the Shermans England can be heard from the tank park. By 2330 hrs a long line of tanks are ready to move. The men are very quiet tonight and leaving MARRSFIELD is a very quiet farewell compared to previous partings. Most of the men are talking in the grass beside their tanks, with no more excitement than a normal exercise would command. There are possibly twelve civilians standing at the exit gate to wave ferewell. The Adv Party boarded ships at 2200 hrs after a trip from 3 RCRP of about 8 miles. 18 Jul 44 Fair and Warm. After 50 hrs of travel the tanks arrive at the ambarkation point. The route MINGIL AND left MARESFIELD then north to EAST GRINSTEAD through LONDON and to the harbour for the remainder of the day a short distance from the docks. Final waterproofing completes the day of very tired officers and men. The 'B' webs arrive at 1030 hrs and all webicles are lined up by boat loads. Maj T B Nash, Maj R A Bradburn, Maj D V Currie, Maj A J Lavoie and Lieut G R Woods have a busy time preparing nominal rolls and vehicle rolls for their respective ships. We are all issued with bright new French notes. Eight air raid alarms were sounded during the night. Twice the sky was aglow with a bright orange flash from the buzz-bombs landing uncomfortably close by. Adv Party sailed at 0900 hrs. Sighted land at 2000 hrs. 19 Jul 44 Fair and warm. All vehicles move to VICTORIA DOCKS for loading. We have no tank craft and it took the whole day to lift each vehicle by crane over the sides into the holds. Loading not completed by 1800 hrs, drivers sleep by the docks until morning to complete the job. Air raid alarms continue all night long and the dock area and LONBON are receiving more buzz bombs. Adv Party - reveille 0300 hrs. Touched land 0625 hrs. Moved to de-waterproofing area, them FR ANCE 19 Jul 44 All to "ARBA". All Fair and warm. Loading complasted by 1000 hrs and tps marched aboard. Moved down the THAMES KNGLAND 20 Jul 44 ESTUARY and anchored in midstream for the remainder of the day. There are approximately 30 ships in the convoy. lined up behind the net guarding the entrance. Only 5 ships are being used by the Regiment. The troops spend the day sleeping on the deck. They enjoyed

a picture show in the afternoon down in the hald. We are told that we are moving at 2000

hrs into the ENGLISH CHANNEL, this is cancelled for 24 hrs.

Warning order was received at 1400 hrs to provide "A" Sqn for a show with the LINCOLN AND WELLAND REGT that night or the next day. Major LAVOIE of "A" Sqn was given the job, and reported to Bde HQ immediately with the CO. The Brigadier's "O" Group was held at 1900 hrs and that of Lt Col McQUEEN of the LINC & WELL R at 2200 hrs in BCURGEBUS (MR 0761). The plan is as follows: The enemy are holding TILLY LA CAMPAGNE (MR 0760), strength uncertain. The LINC & WELLD R are to seize TILLY silently during the night. "A"	MLL
			and "B" Coys are to move in on the left flank and "C" Coy on the right. "D" Coy is to move forward about half way to the objective and form a firm base. "A" Sqn 29 CDN ARMD RECCE REGT is to move to a position just NW of BOURGEBUS before first light, with the following tasks: (1) If the infantry advance proceeds according to plan, "A" Sqn is to move forward to support the LINC & WELLD R in TILLY against a tank counter attack and also to provide a mobile counter counter-attack force. (2) If the attack bogs down and doesn't succeed by first light, they are to shoot the LINCS into their objective. Two 17 pr tanks are attached to "A" Sqn for the show, and also two troops stowed with smoke, from "C" Sqn. The smoke is to give them protection against 88mm A/Tk guns to their front and flanks. The attack by the LINC & WELLD R bogged down due to heavy MG fire from the flank. "A" Sqn could do little to support the infantry at this time, due to darkness.	
	2 Aug	44	Clear and warm. "A" Sqn did their utmost to amout the LINC & WELLD R into TILLY, but without success. They found themselves in a precarious position exposed to enemy fire, and decided it best to stay and observe from their then position throughtout the day.
