This was verified by the 0900 hrs B.B.C. announcement stating that between 0630 and 0800 hrs Allied Landings had been made on the beaches of Northern France. Needless to say that after waiting in this country for almost three years the news was greeted with the greatest enthusiasm and the morale of the Regiment reached a new peak. The dual purpose of this was to check the leading and test the vehicles as they had not been en the read since they were waterpreefed. The Squadren returned to Camp in the early afterneen. It was later learned that the Regiment had suffered its first lesses in France. Considering the nature of their tasks the casualties were light. In the Beach Group, which landed at H plus 20 to direct traffic on the beaches, there was one fatal casualty, Lieut. R.W. Thomson. The L.C.T. carrying Lieut. L.W.K. Craetree was struck by shell fire, and he was reported missing. While preceeding with his duties on the Beach Lieut. K.C. Rowe was hit three times by shrapnel and bullets. The only known casualties in the Centact Detachments were Lieut. C.S. Thompson and D-3873 Tpr. Nassar. L., whese L.C.T. was hit by an 88mm. Beth were thrown into the sea from which they were fortunately rescued. They were taken to the 22nd Field Ambulance where they are new recevering frem "battle exhaustion" Appendix 3. Lieut. R. W.
