All this of course, was only successful, because Lieut. "Stu" Moore, I.O., acted as cook at BnHQ and dished out an excellent breakfast from what appeared at the time to be extra rations. This proved otherwise, because the rations were not extra. Everybody was happy however, and this incident caused quite a laugh.  At 1310 hrs, 454 marching personnel formed up in front of D Coy area and under commend of Major Verne Stott marched, (including baseball bats and balls) to FOLKESTONE Junction. The move was very orderly and the train pulled out at 1430 hr sharp. Major Baker of C Coy was very lucky that Capt. "Dalt"Heyland, S.I.O., had a car at the station, because C Coy left their rations behind and Capt. Heyland drove back for them.  Nothing exciting happened on the train throughout the journey, and at 1803 hrs we pulled into NEWICK CHALEY, North of LEWES. We were met by an English group of offrs and NCOs, and in a very few moments were marching 3 miles to the marshalling area. Many sighs of regret were heard as we passed a signpost saying "Brighton—13 miles". We arrived in camp at 1945 hrs, and due to excellent administration, the party of 484 were in their tents in very short order. BnHQ and Coy Comds were fortunate in obtaining permission to use the Camp Commandants large HQ building and were very comfortable.  Our Marshalling Camp was J5 and praise is to be given to the staff for their |  |
| *   |       |      | excellent administration. The first meal was very good and all went to bed in an excellent frame of mind.  The 355 personnel comprising the vehicle party exhibited intense activity as the made last minute checks of their vehicles and loads before pushing off at 0500 hrs Capt. McQueen and Capt. Macdonell went ahead with guides to the marshalling area and Road Convoy Regulating Post respectively.  The road move was uneventful although several personnel expressed a desire to drop off in LONDON for a "quick one" on the way through.  The Marshalling Area, Camp S5, was reached at 1530 hrs and vehicles and personnel directed to their respective camps. Time was spent in rearranging the vehicle part into 4 craft loads under Capts. McQueen, Tennant, Macdonall and Clarke. Documentation was completed, 25 hr rations packs drawn and sterling exchanged for Franc notes, final stages of waterproofing were completed. At 0830 hrs after an excellent breakfast, we drew "Mae Wests" and "Begs, Vomit" As it was raining so hard little training could be carried out.  At 0915 hrs a Coy Comds meeting was held at BnH% by Major Stott to make sure all standing orders of the Camp were carried out to the fullest, and to lay on the order of Coys for the Mobile baths, to arrive later. The canteen was a very favourite spot and there was loads of beer and items of interest to all, to be purchased a picture show was on in the entertainment tent at 3 times and many attended. At 1600 hrs Capt Paymaster "Rely" Higging completed the exchange of sterling into france for the En party and also issued each man with 200 france as an advance of £1-0-0. Every man must take 200 francs over to France with him, incl all ranks.  In the evening the brand new French notes changed into very old ones, due to certain games being played around the area.  At 1800 hrs "tommy-cookers," twenty four hour rations, bag ration, water sterilization tablets and an emergency ration were issued to all manks. This extra equipment caused many laughs during the process of getting them packed into the small pack. It was found that they could go in if "pressure was exerted".  The vehicle party still in the markhalling area embused in TCVs at 0745 hrs and proceeded to TILBURY docks area. Each unit party got aboard their respective craft and settled down for the sea voyage. Embarkation cards were collected as the troop got aboard.  The men were keenly interested and excited about getting on their way. Some experienced difficulty in getting into a hammook for the first time but that was soon overcome.  Lt.Col.D.G.MacLauchlan was C.C. ship of the American SS Henry Austin.  The four craft with our men and vehicles aboard moved out of the docks during the morning and we anchored in the Thames Estuary off SOUTHEND until the convoy was formed. Our respirator and blankets were transported by truck and we removed our tunics and fastened them on our packs. The march was a gruelling test because of the heat and the stony roads, but all made it and no casualties. At 1930 hrs we arrived in our Div concentration area.  Everyone was very tired on arrival but soon got a meal and bedded down for the night. The vehicle party has not yet arrived.  The evening became very changed from the afternoon with rain and great cool winds. The guns from the direction of CAEN became louder every minute and sleep was very difficult. Shortly the ack-ack opened up from every corner of every field in our vicinity at Jerry aircraft, and then sleep then became impossible until approx 0300 hrs. It all seems so impossible to be within 9-10 miles of the front line and slit trenches are quite in order.  Vehicle party - We climbed on decks this morning to find the convoy steaming up the English Vhannel just off BRIGHTON. Many eyes were turned in that direction to try and pick out familiar objects and buildings. After morning P.T. the men masked in the sunshine on the forward decks. There were the familiar groups playing cards on the canvas covering the holds.  We lost sight of England's fair shore during the afternoon and seemed to be heading directly towards France. At about 1800 hrs we sighted the French coast and steamed slowly forward until we were about three miles off shore. Activity around the En area is kept to a minimum and all coys have their men remaining in slit trenches. Jerry is continually dropping shells around the area, but so far no casualties.  At 0945 hrs Lt.Col.D.G. MacLauchlan, called a Coy Comd's meeting and put the senior officers in the battle picture. Many other current problems were discussed at length and a satisfactory agreement was the result.  The 1.0. was "ticked" off very nicely for not being around when a Bde "O" Gp was called at 2200 hrs last night and the C.O. had to go alone. The 1.0. was interrogating 2 French civilians who had returned to CUSSY, and certainly was at fault. At 1400 hrs the 1.0. was preparing to go to Bde, when a couple of shells exploded nearby and the sound apparently came from the area of Support coy. A phone call was made at once to Support coy and unfortunately a jerry shell lended right in their area and had killed 3 of our men and wounded two. The dead are M35509 Pte. Suchow, K., M33903 Pte. Stafford, R.A., and M104964 Pte.Ingle, B. Cpl.Passmore and Collombeim were injured. Cpl.Lombeim is in hospital and Cpl.Passmore is fairly well and still working with signals.  Two trips to Bde, were made today, to keep up on the warking of maps. Very littinews is forthcoming. 4th Bde took over in the line and tonight the 5th Recoe are going in "dismounted" to releive the Chaudiere. It doesn't look as if 5 Cdn Inf Bdwill move until tomorrow.  Padre Percy held a burial service for the three lads who were killed and "I" Se are preparing crosses for the graves. These graves are at 996702 sheet 7F/1 (ARDENNE ABCE ABBAYE). After the unfortunate accident today everyone is digging the slit trenches a little deeper and are preparing to really occupy them tonight. Scout Officer.

During the Day, it was found that slit trenches were the only safe place to be in the front line, as the hun, accurately and heavily mortared our positions, with all sizes, including the 15 cm, and his 6 barrelled N.B.W.'s. It is rumoured that the I.O. was anything but comfortable during his stay in the line and did not sleep a single wink. The night patrol was cancelled as far as the group of 5 was concerned therefore the I.O. did not get a chance at patrolling. We are quite sure that he was not unhappy over the situation.

The I.O. produced air photos, (of course not set up and recieved a ticking off) and mapsand the Coy Comds' studied the situation and were very happy with the set up.

At 1400 hrs Lt. Col. D.G. MacLauchlan called a meeting of all officers of Bn. H.Q. and the R.S.M. and laid down the battle location policy of the various portions of Bn.H.Q. within the groups. This very important and certainly not understood set up was explained in detail and the various queer people, such as Adjt, Sigs, I.O. M.O . and R.S.M. are now completely in the picture. This meeting was a very much needed one for all concerned. During the evening all was quiet around the area. Pipe Maj. Neil Sutherland played his pipes for an hour within our lines.

| After a fairly noisy night everybody was quite ready to sleep all day. However, duties kept all busy in one way or another, particularly the officers, with 0 Gps and their many normal duties.  Plans are under way for the next big step of the offensive. Our portion is to take and hold, MAY-SUR-ORNE during phase I of the attack towards the high ground at CINTHAUX. This move of the Calgary's presents many problems to Lt.Col.D.G. MacLauchlin, because the ground west of the ORNE at MAY SUR ORNE is heavily covered by fire from the enemy and a very sturdy defense line faces us from the front.  During the day we were shelled many times and also mortared consistently.  Lt.Col.D.G. MacLauchlin went out of the line today to get a very much needed rest and also to get a general clean up. During the recome jeep had a hole punched in the radiator by flying shrapnel, and the Coy Comds had to push the jeep back to 4th Bde HQ. At 0800 hrs the I.O. and a working party of 6 ORs and 1 sigs and 1 pioneer went to 4th Bde HQ. The I.O. got off there and the party went forward to the Essex Scottish and were met by Cpl. Melanchuk who took them to the new comd post of BnHQ to dig in and reinforce the post for easier execution of control during the attack.  The I.O. interrogated the patrols who had been out during the night in the TILLY area and the results of the patrols were far from good. The patrol report was put on a trace and the C.O. studied it in conjunction with Brig. Magill during the latter part of the morning. At 1200 hrs Lt.Col.D.G.MacLauchlan went to 060606 and witnessed the registration of our arty tasks for the attack. The results were gratifying.  During the afternoon everyone spent an hour or two in resting and at 1790 hrs the 6.O. held a co-ordinating conference of Coy Comds and all supporting arms, plus tanks, to tie in all remaining points for the attack tonight. 

The route to be followed was clearly marked and guides were placed by important points. We are to pass down south around IPS to Trottval Fm and form up in the Essex Scottish area behind 050506. EnHQ including "t." ol.D.G. MacLauchlan and I.O. in the C.O's carrier and Capt. Ross Ellia, Adjutant in the K Sigs truck left A Echelon at 0015 hrs and crossed country in almost total darkness. They arrived sately at the FUP after two or three lost moments and were surprised to find the marching tps already in the FUP area.  The C.O. and I.O. immediately followed by the Adjutant proceeded up the road, learning the carrier behind and entered the prepared EnHQ in the basement of the pump house at 060506. An ops room was immediately set going and K Sigs and En Sigs set their wireless in their own prepared poss below ground. The troops formed up behind the start line upon arrival and waited until 0230 hrs(H Hour). At 0230 hrs arty was also to start up in support.  During the hour preceding H Hour reports came in from En Scouts who were already forward of "yellow" with a section of carriers that the coast was clear for our advance. No movement had been heard around TILIY except the occasional movement of a tracked veh in the distance. This news plus the news that there were no mines pleased Lt.Col.D.G.MacLauchlan and all is set to go ahead as prearranged.  At 0230 hrs, all hell let loose, and our arty pounded the ground following the tasks laid on by the C.O., and our men advanced. At 0232 hrs D Ooy passed "Blue" the start line, and was immediately followed by the other coys in their own respective lines of advance. Shortly after this message, another message came through that our troops were under terrific shell fire from our own art This caused great concern for the C.O. and yet it did not seem possible. No tasks were being fired even close to our own troops. Word was sent out to the coys concerned that it was Hun counter shell fire and could not be our own arty. However strong our messages were regarding this unfortunate feeling amongst the troops, messages continued to pur in to ops that it was our own arty. Lt.Col.D.G. MacLauchlan had our fire stopped and still word was received that our own troops were under our own art; fire. This immediately proved that the Hun was up to his old trick of firing into our own barrage and in this case it was working to perfection. Many casualties were caused by this Hun fire.  Throughout the next few very a nxious hours we received several setbacks. Some of our troops managed to get into TILLY but were immediately pinned by terrific NG fir and mortar fire. B Coy knocked out 2 tanks with the Piat and finally we received word that the coys could not possibly get into TILLY itself. This was caused by terrific counter fire and our troops dug in close to the railway tracks. Our troops were then forced back and then against terrific odds in the form of fire power, at approx 1000 hrs and with very few men left, under Major Bill McQueen, Major Wynn Lasher and Major Del Harrison the troops withdrew to the original start line "Blue".  During this time a coy of the Royal Regiment was committed to assist our troops forward. This attempt failed however and the R.R.C took up position near the start line on the south side of the axis of advance. Our men withdrew and were quickly organized behind the start line and under the remaining officers formed an all roundefense between "Blue" and "Zellow".  All troops were dug in at once and prepared for an enemy counter attack because word was received that enemy tanks and troops were advancing on our HQ. This was unfounded it was disclosed later and the Coy Comds then were called to Ha and explaed their decision to withdraw to the C.O. Before the withdrawal the few remaining men were without auto weapons or Piats and Capt. Tennant got them a supply from one and all sources and his carriers managed to get them forward to the front line up the main road of advance under cover of a heavy fog. The fog was a god send because the Hur had the road covered by 85s. After the coy commands had received orders from the C.O. they moved to their coy areas and prepared to advance once again. During the next few minutes, rations arrived and hot tea was taken to every man in the line. The advance started at 1430 hrs and the troops managed to get to "Yellow" under heavy MG fire. We moved through VIMOUTIERES, through rubble fire and shell holes, over a route recceld by Capt. Mark Tennant. It was the only route through town that could be used and it was a very difficult one. Passing through VIMOUTIERES we found the remnants of an R H C Coy which had been mixed up by the enemy.

Our route took us through formidable forests and roads and which we were quite aware contained enemy. Every moment we expected to contact the enemy and were constantly on the alert. Strange as it may seem we arrived in LE BOSCARIE at 0530 hrs without having one enemy round fired at us. A defensive posn was taken up at once, and we had no trouble until B Coy under Capt "Knobby" Clark moved fwd to the high gd to our front. Here the enemy resented being disturbed in his bridge demolition and fired a few 88s into B Coy causing 2 casualties and I death. B Coy forced the enemy back and took up their posn. At 1830 hrs word arrived for us to move at once to ORBEC which had just been taken by the Camerons. At 1900 hrs Lt. Col. D. G. MacLauchlan attended a meeting at Bde with Brigadier Megill and word was given out to be prepared to move into ORBIE later tonight. Upon returning from Bde the C.O. called the Coy Comds together and tied in the route and move in general. We are to move quickly when the order arrives. There certainly appears to be no rest for the Bn and that we will keep pushing the Hun back now he is on the run.

#### Weather Fair and warm

Orders for our move Eastward through ORBEC and to our ultimate objective of THIBERVILLE were received at 2400 hrs last night. Me were to move after oran hrs tthis morning and managed to be directly on time. We moved on Homean passing the start line in MEULLES at the ordered time of 0600 hrs.

The route was partly across country but had already been record by Bde. The movement fwd took place very orderly and just after getting nicely under way, orders were received to curl the Bn up around Pt 174 slightly west of ORBEC and await further orders. The Bn was curled up at this point and the Hun shelled and mortared all around the area. Code word "Halleluyah" was our signal to start fwd through ORBEC and on to THIBERVILLE. Lt. Col. D. G. MacLauchlan remained at Bde TAC HQ until word of 6th Bde was received as to their progress. This infm was very important because the FMR was to attack ST GERMAIN LE COM-PAGNE and to secure it as a step fwd for our Bn. "Halleluyah" was received at 1030 hrs and the Bn moved fwd with C Coy, followed by D Coy, B Coy and A Coy. The C.O. had gone fwd with Brig. Megill to a point in ORBEC and the I.O. brought the CO's carrier fwd with Bde TAC BQ. During the slow movement of TAC HQ word arrived for the IO to pass through the column and meet the C.O. along the route in ORBEC.

ORBEC proved to be a very "hot" spot and the Bn was sure knocked about by hy mortar and shellfire incl 55s in the centre of the town. When the toll was summed up later we found only 18 cas, much to our amazement. I Section suffered 3 cas in ORBEC unfortunately, and two of the original gang, Pte. Jack Sheard and Pte. Dan McCaptney were killed and Pte.Len Flynn was wounded. The scouts also lost 5 men incl Lieut. Bert Ross, the Scout officer. These men were all wounded and no fatalities. P.T.O.

The Bn was informed that the FMR were still short of their objective at "Mickey" minus 800 and our progress was severely held up. C Coy pushed fwd and joined the tail of the FMR A Coy who were pushing fwd to ST GEPMAIN. This little village was surrounded by enemy MGs and several tanks who fought a delaying battle and managed successfully for several hours in doing this job.

All higher fmns became very agitated at the delay in the Bns getting fwd even in the face of such opposition. Very shortly, Lieut.Col.D.G. MacLauchlan ligised with the C.O. of the FMR and immediately put over C Coy in to assist the FMR coy fwd. D Coy was pushed around to the left flank with the intention of attacking ST GERMAIN from that direction and to assist in holding down the enemy fire coming from that direction on to the FMRA coy and our own C Coy adv along the central axis of the main road from ORBEC to THIBERVILLE, One coy was apparently unsufficient on the left flank and the CO sent B Coy around with D Coy and ordered A Coy to come up behind C Coy, on the Main axis. During all the afternoon while we were in the "hold up" posn the enemy heavily shelled and mortared our column with very little if any success. It was really only annoying fire and we lived through it quite happily. Our artillery pounded ST GERMAIN and surrounding area during all of this time and when at 1900 hrs we finally attacked ST GERMAIN the enemy fire had ceased considerably. The left flank caused considerable trouble however and D and B Coys remained tight until C Coy and A Coy with the FMR had gotten in to the town, itself. When the code word "How 3 Able" and "How 1 Able" was received Lieut. Col. D. G. MacLauchlan shot the 2 left flanking coys into the town from the left. D Coy managed to get through but B Coy was badly mauled by tanks and became pinned to the ground.

The command Gp led by Capt. Mark Tennant in a jeep ran the gauntlet through 85 fire and sniping to a group of bldgs slightly south west of ST GERMAIN and once again as usual had several nar ow escapes when a Jerry 85 placed directly up the straight road near ST GERMAIN, laid shells down the road and hit two carriers and narrowly missed the Command Gp. The Comd Gp raced into the court yard of this group of bldgs and were no sooner inside when the enemy heavily shelled the area and bldg. Only one cas resulted here, when a DR received a

At 0400 hrs after an anxious few hours waiting the inevitable word to push fwd, Bde ordered the Bn to be moving at 0500 hrs and to follow the R H C who were proceeding to LE RANQUAY. The Black Watch proceeded fwd as ordered at 0400 hrs and pushed fwd with no enemy opposition. We passed our start line at 0500 hrs as ordered and then we had a visit from the enemy. As we passed through ST GERMAIN with the vehs of Command Gp and took up our posn in the column of marching troops we were suddenly fired upon from a side street, by a hy weapon and then heard the rumble of tanks, certainly none of which could possibly be ours because there were no Allied tracked heavy vehs in the vicinity. The column broke and took up posn on both sides of the cross roads and PIATS were brought into action. The section of carriers with BnHQ fired and on the second bomb the enemy veh broke into flames. It was later disclosed that our arty rep, Capt. Walter Newman had made a roundabout the left side of the Cathedral and brought PIAT fire on the vehs from the left flank. It was soon made clear we had hit and destroyed 2 large enemy halftrack troop transports and the explosions and fire caused by the two vehs was intense. The vehs were filled with mines and demolition eqpt. We killed one Hun and severely wounded another but the balance ran away in the darkness. Enemy tanks were also heard cavorting about and when this situation was reported to Bde, we were ordered to sit tight in ST GERMAIN in our original layout of coys, and await orders to proceed.

flowers and food and drink. Our new area in BOURNAINVILLE is very good
and a welcome haven after the pouring rain we had experienced all day.

Four German prisoners were taken incl two SS men. One is from the 1 SS

Pz(Recce) and this brings our list of SS for the week to representatives
of 1-2-3-7-9-12 SS tps. They are a hateful arrogant bunch of heartless
humanity and they are given no consideration when they are taken by us.

The usual procedure is to have them dig slit trenches(for us) exactly
to their own measurements.

We got to bed around 2230 hrs and looked fwd to a much needed sleep after 5 days without sleep.

Weather Cool and heavy rain.

At 0800 hrs the Bn moved off from BOURNAINVILLE to its new locn at ST CYR DE SALERNE. The move was made by TCV and of course this pleased everyone immensely. The route taken was through DURANVILLE and BOISNEY northwards to ST CYR. The day was perfectly beautiful with bright sunshine and a warm wind, which added to the already excellent spirits of one and every man.

Last night was the very first sleep any of us had had in several days. and the few hours obtained in BOURNAINVILLE were very welcome. The movement took place quietly and due to Capt. Mark Tennant's excellent recce ability the Bn was immediately whipped into posn, although the local French farmer didn't exactly like our mucking up his orchard, he had to take it and like it.

It so happened that his orchard wasn't hurt anyway and he was finally quite happy. During the day activity was practically nil and the tps generally cleaned up clothes and bodies and rested while they could do

At 1630 hrs Lieut.Col.D.G.MacLauchlan was called to Bde to an "O"Gp and when it finished we had exactly 30 mins to get the Bn on the move and in posn with the balance of 5 GIB to cross the river RISLE and on to the SEINE. This time however lagged on and on because very shortly after 1730 hrs we were told to sit tight and move at 1830 hrs and then again this time was changed so that we were still in the area around the TCVs at 2330 hrs.

At 2330 hrs the Hun dropped many flares from planes and it struck queer to see one complete area ringed by bright lights. At this same time the CO was called up by the Brig to check line "Wynn"9394 to attend a conference. Report line "Wynn" was the posn across the river RISLE of the fwd recce gps of the Sth Recce. This route is our man axis through to the SEINE river. As the CO and I were pulling well away from the Bn area on the way to "Wynn" it was a horrible meight to see the Bn being very heavily bombed by the Hun. Lieut. Col. D.G. MacLauchlan had to push ahead anyway and when comms from the carrier to the Bn failed, it was a very definite feeling of anxiety that overcame the CO and IO and yet nothing could be done at the time.

Weather Fair and warm.

At 0100 hrs Lieut. Col. D. G. MacLauchlan and the IO arrived at the HQ 5 CIB on line Wynn 9394 and here many hours of waiting took place, once again. The RHC were to pass through in TCVs to the SEINE river by 0300 hrs but this movement did not take place until 0500 hrs and we were brought up in TCVs immediately in RHC rear. Following us were the R de Mais. We followed the axis of adv, on foot having dismounted at check line Wynn on the excellent intuition of the C.O. Just because the RHC had passed through to their objective without trouble from the enemy was no indication that all would be smooth with us. For one thing we were advancing by daylight, while the RHC had passed through in darkness.

#### INTERNATIONAL STATEMENT OF THE STATEMENT

After a fair night's rest we were awakened with the most velcome surprise of breakfast actually being on time, for a change. It sure is queer how meals become irregular once in a while, and also funnier still, how it takes cooks two and a half hours to prepare a can of bully beef and hardtack, C'est la guerre. Our cay queer was in adjuste. In conform well and different like autual 152.

The day was very quiet with little or no activity around the area. Everyone managed a couple of extra hours sleep and a little clean up, certainly not that it wasn't needed. The dust of the day before was very thickly caked on one and all and when we awakened we looked more like a negro side show than white people. During to day as committee as turner patiels to the contending one methoding bett causes a capacity.

Strangely we were not warned to move during the day and when 1800 hrs arrived we became a little anxious because we certainly wouldn't be allowed a whole day of rest. We were quite right because at 1930 hrs the 60 was varned for a Bde "0" Op "Green" and to be there at 2130 hrs. The Bde "0" Op brought about news of a move for us tomorrow to an area south of the city of ROUEN and we would cross the class 9 bridge at ELBEOUF when the bridge was in operation. Time could not be set at that time because of the uncertainty of the time of completion of the bridge. We do know however that we shall cross some time tomorrow.

Once again for a change the RHC will precede us and this is welcome news. We are to take over from the 10 Bde and form a firm base. The R de Mais will then clear a route through ROUEN for the continuation of Trump route, on our push to DIEPPE. It is hard to believe that we shall soon be in DIEPPE the city where Canadians have a real score to settle. Total prisoners of war taken for the last couple of days amount to 42 ORs no officers.

After the Bde "O" Gp Lieut.Col.D.G.MacLauchlan held an "O" Gp and when it lasted until after midnight the IO Lieut.Stu Moore promptly fell asleep and this evidently wasn't the thing to do because shortly he was awakened by none other than the CO. It has been a quiet day in all respects with no enemy action. This quietness continued all evening and so to bed.

For a change this morning we awakened to a fairly dull day and from all appearances rain was certainly in the air. We were just thinking how nice a rest might be, when out of a clear blue sky an "O" Gp was called at Bde and for the Co to get there as soon as possible. The warning "Huddle Green" means We are moving. Preparations were started at once by Major Ross Ellis our Adjt to get the Bn ready to move and Lieut. Col D.G. MacLauchlan and the I.O. went on to Bde at approx 1100 hrs.

Upon returning from Bde, the CO held an "O" Gp and put the Coy Comds and supporting arms in the picture. We are not to go through to ROHEN as previously decided but of all things to go fwd to LA CHENAIE 025043 and relieve the Camerons of Canada. Most pecularly this new posn is our original objective for the last show, when at the last moment we were deflected from that axis, northwards to point 132, 007020.

The take over is in conjunction with the prospective move fwd of 6 Bde and our move will take place as soon as the Camerons of Canada move out or are at least ready to move. The news is that the Camerons of Canada have been having a tough go of it and we will possibly walk into a hornet's nest, as usual. Time past our start line was set for 1345 hrs and we left our F Ech in area of 007020 and took only stripped F Ech with us. The complete command gp travelled as a packet itself and moved independently of the marching troops.

At 1400 hrs the C.O. and command gp arrived at HQ 5 CIB and there remained while the marching troops arrived in the general area of ST MARTINS 035020. There the Bn curled up and awaited further orders which depended on the infm from the Camerons of Canada. During the afternoon Lieut. Col. D.G. MacLauchlan conferred with Brigadier Megill re plans, etc and at 1800 hrs word arrived that the 6th Bde move, comprising the SSR, attacking through the Camerons of Canada was to take place at 2000 hrs. Marching tps were pushed ahead to the railroad and track junction at 055040 and curled up in that area, until they could go right in and take over from the C of

At approx 2100 hrs the coys were ordered fwd to take over and F Ech was to follow in packets under Capt. Mark Tennant. The Hun was merrily mortaring and shelling TAC HQ and all coy posns from the time of arrival until the coys reported "Able" around 2400 hrs, and then it subsided.

29 Aug

Today has been a nightmare for the Bn in our hazardous position in the FORET DE LA IONDE. All day long we were subjected to heavy MG, rifle, Schmeiser fire and to continuous harassing long range shellfire interspersed with 88 from the village of LE CHENAIE. We were dug in on the reverse slope of the high feature west of LE CHENAIE and had little protection from the type of fire that was directed at us.

Six prisoners were taken and strangely they were only from ersatz Bns. The fire that rained on us certainly couldn't have come from this bunch of scruff because they are certainly not the type. The day was probably the most hectic on, the Bn has had, bar none, and this includes TILLY LE COMPAGNE and ST ANDRE SUR ORNE. The fire was no heavier than any time before, but was certainly more constant.

During the day the 6th Bde on our right flank had a very bad time as well as ourselves and finally at 1800 hrs the SSR misinterpreted an order and withdrew from their vital position. Shortly afterwards the Camerons followed suit and it took considerable trouble and worry to get these two Bns back into position. In the evening the C.O. was called to Bde and was greated with the excellent and very welcome news that the 5th Bde was to pull out and the only position of the 3 Bns to be relieved was to be ourselves. We were to be relieved by 2 coys of the FMR and the balance of the front was to be held by the Camerons and the SSR.

We were moved by tpt to a new and very much quieter area near ELBOUF. It was a wonderful relief and also a terrific shock to find our cas for the day from the shelling totalled 43.0Rs and 3 Offrs. Lieut. Ernie Teagle, Lieut. Bud Shantz, and Lieut. Jim Dutton were unfortunately hurt, the extent of their injuries is not known at present. We arrived in our new area near ELBOUF at 2400 hrs and were quickly bedded down.

Weather Rain and very dull

After an excellent night's rest we awakened to a nice bright morning and everyone was found in good spirits even after the terrible nightmare of yesterday. We all awaited word for the Bn to move at anytime and Capt. Mark Tennant had gone fwd at 0830 hrs with Bde across the SEINE to point 88 at 233125 to recce and arrange the take over from the 7th Bde.

The Bn was to take over from the Cdn Scot. When this arrangement had been made the CO returned to the Bn and no sooner had the CO started his "O" G p when word arrived that former plans were off and we were to send the Recce party fwd to MESNIL ESNARD south of ROUEN to arrange take over from the 9th Bde instead of the 7th Bde.

The map reference of the meeting place for the recce parties was given wrongly and after waiting for Brigadier Megill for 2 hours we were advised to return to our own area and await orders. In the meantime the CO found that the Bn was already moving fwd and we were to relieve the Cdn Scot after all at 253125 over night and prepare to move at first light fwd to take over from the HLI of the 9th Bde. During the evening at 0800 hrs the CO and IO travelled to MESNIL ESNARD and liaised with the HLI and arranged complete take over first thing tomorrow morning.

At 2300 hrs rain came down in torrents and nearly flooded the lads out of their slit trenches. Major Ross Ellis claims the convoy and move from ELBOUT across the SEINE to 233125 as the worst trip the Bn has ever made.

31 Aug 44

Weather Rain and dull

At 0630 hrs the R H C passed through to BOAS and on to MESNIL ESNARD and we followed on their feetoff hr later. We took over from the HLI and curled up around the BnHQ, because word arrived we would move in a very few minutes through ROUEN to SIERLVILLE at 1831. The move took place very orderly and within 1 hr of arriving at MESNIL ESNARD we were again on the move to SIERLVILLE. The route through ROBEN northwards to SIERLVILLE and the sights that met our eyes leave memories that will last forever in our minds. We were greeted with huge crowds, who threw flowers, wine and cakes at our vehs. The entire column of 5 CIB was embussed and we travelled 17 miles north at a very fast pace with only the occasional stop. It was very queer to travel so far at such a pace and never once meeting the enemy. The enly enemy we saw all were 70 prisoners taken without much of a struggle. The only struggle was at SIEREVILLE between our recce party under Capt. Mark Tennant and 10 Jerries.

As our recce party entered a farm house recceing our BnHQ they were fired
